#### What is TALIS?

The Teaching and Learning International Survey (TALIS) collects internationally comparable data on the learning environment and the working conditions of teachers and principals in schools across the world.

The results of the survey continue to provide valid, timely and comparable information from the perspective of school practitioners to help countries review and define policies for a high-quality teaching profession.

As TALIS collects data from a range of countries within the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), the survey enables participating countries to identify other countries facing similar challenges, analyse their results and learn from other policy approaches.

#### What do we learn?

TALIS asks teachers about working conditions and learning environments. Questions cover themes such as initial teacher education, professional development, feedback processes, the school climate, and teachers' instructional beliefs and pedagogical habits.

By contributing to TALIS, teachers help to provide valuable insights that can be used to identify and address instructional challenges, inform policy, and develop strategies to improve educational conditions both in Australia and around the world.

### Will my school be involved?

Australia's participation in TALIS is managed by the Australian Council for Educational Research which is currently preparing for the 2018 cycle.

Note that this third TALIS cycle is being conducted in the southern hemisphere during Term 4 of 2017. A randomly selected sample of Australian primary and secondary schools will be invited to participate, and to contribute to our growing understanding of the teaching profession both locally and internationally.
